A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PASTOR

<u>DO IT!!</u>

When John the Baptist announced that judgement was imminent, the people asked how they might be spared. He said in effect, "Do the things that show you belong to God Don't rest on your religious affiliation. If you have two shirts, give one to him who has none. If you have food, share it. Tax collectors, see that you don't collect more than is legal. Soldiers, don't forcibly extract money; be content with your pay." (Luke 3:1-14) Most of Jesus' direct instructions had to do with deeds, not doctrines. He even said that we would be judged by whether we did specific things like visiting prisoners and giving a cup of cold water. He announced that the tax collector, Zaccheus, was "saved" because he pledged to give half his fortune to the poor and repay the people he had cheated in excess of 400%. What we believe will determine what we do. So, doctrine is important. But what we do can betray what we say we believe. Therefore, the word for Christians is "DO IT!"

PRAISE SOMEONE YOU KNOW

Every week, praise two people you know each day and be quiet about the others. I don't know of a better way to do Christianity than to give affirmations because we live in an infirming world, a world of put-downs, satire, repartee, one-upmanship. Kenneth Erickson, in The Power of Praise, says the average child hears nine infirming comments to one affirming comment during the first seven years of life! Parents, peers, professors, coaches and teachers should know that ridicule is not only ridiculous but evil. If I praise two people a day and they follow suit in geometric progression, two million people would hear an encouraging word in three weeks! This is not a pep talk for salespeople. It's a powerful way to change the world. Praise can be real. You don't have to fake it. It's not empty flattery. If you can't find something good to say about somebody, you're not thinking on an average level of intelligence. Uh Oh! Do you realize what I just did? In the name of affirmation, I criticized critics! Satan is alive and well (sick).

<u>MEND A FENCE</u>

For starters, regularly mend old fences. Get rid of an enemy by making up with him. Shakespeare had it right: To err is human. Anybody can hate, harbor resentment, lick old wounds; but to forgive is divine business. God has to be involved. Where there is making up, there is God. Forgiveness comes in different shapes and sizes. You can even forgive the dead. Fortunately, we can mend most of our fences with people who are present. Families can do it. Church people can do it. Nations can do it.

<u>TITHE</u>

If I could recommend only one "do it", I would choose one that sounds peculiar: Give away the first ten cents of every dollar you receive to help someone. Tithing is an acid test of our commitment. I love the bumper sticker that says, "IF YOU LOVE JESUS, TITHE, ANYBODY CAN HONK!!" In Christendom, there is a lot more honking than tithing. This is because the God of our age is Mammon. In New York, a visiting Indian Guru saw the people rushing about Grand Central Station and asked his host, "What's wrong with these people? Is there a devil behind them?" "No," said the host. "There's a dollar sign in front of them." There is only one way to be a Christian with money. Give a proportion of it away. Give it off of the top. Give it regularly.

In West Texas a person was speaking to the congregation about parenting. He began by reading to them in Malachi, the last book of the Old Testament. In Malachi 3:6-9 God asks the people: "Do you think, it's good to rob me? Well, that's what you are doing!" "How?" you ask. By withholding your tithes! You give me sick animals and bad corn. You find ways to cheat." The speaker closed the Bible and looked at the people. "If I were serious about being an effective parent, I'd begin by tithing. Because you can't expect your kids to be honest if you cheat God on a regular basis."

There was the son of his deceased mother who was going to gather personal effects and close her home. He began to thumb through his mother's checkbook. After every recorded deposit from Social Security, there was the first check made out to her church in the exact amount of 10 percent of the deposit. Then there were utility, food and medical payments. The son said, "You know, the story of Mom's values is in her checkbook." Check stubs, bank accounts, calendars, time pieces speak louder than words.

All of the above "DO ITS" will not help you find God; Nor, will they make God love you more.

Do them because God has already found you. Do them because you will help Him find others. Do them because you have experienced what it is to be: Alive, Free, Forgiven, Hopeful and Loved. Do it because you Love God, Trust God and Believe God can do more with 10% of your income than you can do with 100%. Don't do it because you ought to — do it because you want to.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE: As we go into fall, good stewardship becomes an emphasis in our worship calendar. It is a part of our lives that we should practice daily, but sometimes we need a reminder. We need reminders of what good stewardship encompasses; why we should practice it and how we can go about it.

During the next few weeks, we will all be hearing some answers to these questions. There will be a time for each of us to come forward with a pledge card, expressing a financial commitment to this church and the support of God's work here. There will be a Time and Talent list to allow each of us to offer our God-given time and talents to actively, physically participate in carrying out the missions of our Lord within this church and community.

It is a good time to sit back and reflect on our personal level of stewardship, good stewardship, and get our own answer to the last question — Can we hear that soft whisper? — Luke 19:17

The second lesson in this series is "God With Us In Our Uncertainty."


God accompanies the called; it is God's presence in our weakness that equips us for our calling.


WEDNESDAY NIGHT BIBLE STUDY
