Here are the top ten leadership competencies of which our church family prays our next installed pastor will be gifted —

Compassionate — having the ability to suffer with others; being motivated by others pain and is called into action as advocate; is motivated by caring for others while concurrently keeping the organizational goals clearly in focus.

Preaching and Worship Leadership — is a consistently effective preacher and worship leader; is able to inspire from the pulpit; communicates a clear and consistent message through sermons that are carefully prepared and artfully delivered; projects the identity and character of the congregation through worship leadership presence.

Spiritual Maturity — shows strong personal depth and spiritual grounding; demonstrates integrity by walking the talk and by responding with faithfulness of purpose; is seen by others as trustworthy and authentic; nurtures a rich spiritual life; seeks the wisdom and guidance of appropriate mentors; is able to articulate a clear and consistent theology.

Teacher — creates learning environments where students are active participants as individuals and as members of collaborative groups; designs lesson plans that teach concepts, facts, and theology; effectively uses multiple learning tools to reach a wide variety of learners; revises instructional strategies based upon ministry/organization context.

Communicator — advances the abilities of individuals and the organizations through active listening supported with meaningful oral and written presentation of information.

Advisor — an individual others turn to for counsel and guidance; provides coaching; expertise for congregations or other organizations.

Organizational Agility — is astute about how congregations and/or organizations work; knows how to get things done through formal and informal channels; understands the importance of supporting good policy, practice, and procedure; appreciates the power in the culture of a congregation; is politically savvy.

Collaboration — has a natural orientation toward getting people to work together; shares wins and successes; fosters open dialogue; lets people finish and be responsible for their work; creates strong feelings of belonging among group members; is a good judge of talent and can accurately assess the strengths and limitations of others.

Motivator — creates and sustains an organizational culture which permits others to provide the quality of service essential to high performance. Enables others to acquire the tools and support they need to perform well; and influences others toward a spirit of service and meaningful contributions to mission accomplishment.

Decision Making — makes effective decisions, balancing analysis, wisdom, experience, and judgment; is aware of the long term implications of choices made; is generally regarded as offering solutions and suggestions that are correct and effective.

Our Pipe Organ!

Our historic organ was purchased in 1935. It was designed specifically for our sanctuary; and was built and installed by the Austin Organ Company, started in 1893. It was faithfully and gloriously played and had accompanied thousands of anthems and solos for 83 years. It has been silent since October 10, 2018. Now, we're working with Tadlock Piano and Organ Company of Panama City, to get it repaired and restored to once again enhance our worship services; be played for special services, concerts and more. We've set aside some funds; and "over and above" organ repair donations are being given. Watch for a letter explaining our need and how all of us can make this restoration a reality — perhaps in memory or honor of someone special. The technicians are scheduled to begin in January! PRESBYTERIAN QUESTIONS,

PRESBYTERIAN ANSWERS

"Why do Presbyterian churches put so much emphasis on Christian education?"

"When Jesus was asked "which commandment in the law is the greatest?" he replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" (Matthew 22:37; Mark 12:30; Luke 10:27). In this Jesus was indicating that we are to bring to our faith in God the best thought and understanding of which we are capable, and we are to use all our intellectual capabilities to serve in our love for God.

Our Presbyterian tradition has taken this perspective seriously, and has historically stressed education generally, theological education for clergy and Christian education in the church for laity, very strongly. John Calvin began the Genevan Academy, which educated citizens and clergy. Churches in our tradition have been active in establishing colleges and universities. Local Presbyterian churches in the United States have longestablished Sunday school programs as well as other innovative educational opportunities for children, youth, and adults. We emphasize education because we believe that, as the twentieth-century theologian Karl Barth put it, "The knowledge of God is the service of God." As we learn of God, we

Another way to see this is in terms of a theological motto that is part of our Presbyterian tradition. It is inherited from Augustine, during the period of the early church. We believe that "faith leads to understanding," Our faith in Jesus Christ inevitably propels us into wanting to learn more of Christ, of God's actions, and of what is revealed in Holy Scripture. So we stress Bible study, theological study, and the whole panorama of topics that will help us better understand God, the world, humanity, and all that God does. We believe children of Christian parents should embark on a lifetime of learning, particularly learning about the fullness of the Christian faith. Adult Presbyterians also have strong responsibilities to grow in their faith by seeking further understanding. Without the stimulus of new ideas and perceptions, our Christian faith can stagnate and not be all it can be. Christian education in the church enhances our faith and leads us ever farther into obeying Jesus' prescription to love God "with all our minds."
